We are just like Peter.

Why do you have to keep talking about the kingdom? Why do you have to keep talking about dying and rising again? There's a kingdom all around. There's a kingdom in your heart.

But we don't want the kingdom.

We want the miracle. We want the proof.

But God never promised us any proof.
